From the Newsletter Chair: Mike K

Hello everyone, from the Newsletter desk. My name is Mike and I'm an alcoholic! Sue Y decided to step down as Newsletter Chair, so I picked it up. Many of you know me around the various meetings in the area but haven't heard my story. Therefore, I'm going to give you the opportunity to know me just a little bit more.

I first became sober in 2007 in Binghamton, NY. It was my first sobriety EVER! I came in the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous a lost soul. Broken and beaten so badly by my alcoholism, I knew I needed to change. I just didn't know how. After several months of just listening, I finally asked a gentleman to be my Sponsor. We went through the 12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous and I had that spiritual experience. Alcoholics Anonymous provided me "revolutionary change in their way of living and thinking (p. 51).

I went to Broome Community College obtaining my Associates of Applied Science in Computer Information Systems becoming interested in computer programming. During that time I also had the opportunity to work at the Addictions Crisis Center in Binghamton, NY, as a Program Aide where I worked the graveyard shift(11pm to 7am) helping addicts coming directly off the streets start on their own recovery journeys. After several years there, I decided on a career change later becoming a Certified Nursing Assistant working in Ithaca, NY. Eventually I moved to Van Etten, NY, after which I didn't get connected with the local AA community. My life began to slip away. I wasn't doing what Alcoholics Anonymous had taught me to do. Eventually I drank again.

After several months, I had a moment of clarity – I was killing myself. I had to do something – I had to do it fast. In the middle of the night at the beginning of September, I walked from Van Etten, NY, to Elmira, NY to seek help. After an ten hour walk through the back roads of Chenango County, NY, I ended up at CASA -Trinity, a chemical dependency treatment provider. Without an appointment, their staff began the process of helping me find an inpatient rehab. I was only to return home again. Eventually I was admitted to Dick Van Dyke Addiction Treatment Center.

My new sobriety date was September 14, 2018. After 30 days I was sent to Liberty Resources / Supportive Living program where I have lived since. As soon as I got here, I immediately got involved in AA because I knew my life would get better - “One Day At A Time”. After getting a Sponsor quickly, going through the 12 Steps, sponsoring others and helping on a District level, I can’t be more happier in life.

I just celebrated my first year of recovery. Eventually I want to become a Certified Peer Advocate (a relatively new position in the recovery community) to further help those who still struggle with their addictions and bring hope into their lives – recovery works if you are willing to do the work.

Each and every one of you have touched my life in some way by sharing of your experience, strength and hope. I want to thank each and every one of you for helping me stay sober - “One Day At A Time”


